#### From the Pastor:

My sister has a special "this could only happen to you" category for unusual things that seem to regularly happen to me. The latest of these occurrences literally got my goat.

It all started when I looked out in my pasture and saw something that I thought might be a Black Angus calf, but I knew that the cows shouldn't be calving yet. As I got closer, the animal got up and I was able to see that it was not a calf at all, but rather a black female goat. I could not imagine what a goat was doing in my pasture, because I had never owned a goat in my life, but there she was. She had an ear tag in her right ear, so I knew that she belonged to someone, but to whom? I went up and down our road asking neighbors if they knew anyone who owned goats, but nobody did. I put a notice on Facebook and nobody claimed the goat, so I began to think that maybe I owned a goat!

However, I could see that this was not going to work, because she was constantly walking through every 4-barbwire fence that I have and would graze in my back lawn and liked to come up onto my porch to get out of the rain. By this time, I was used to seeing her every time I pulled up near the garage and decided to give her a name. I called her Annie the Nanny. It was a little unnerving to see her right outside the living room window staring intently at me as I watched television. Not only was she leaving her little black goat pellets all over my porch and sidewalk, but clearly there was no future for her here when spring rolled around. Since she could walk through every fence I have, she would be waltzing over to the neighbor's field destroying their corn next May after planting season.

I knew that Annie had to go somewhere where the boundaries were firmer and I finally found her a home. Our great-nephew, Jason has a few goats and said he would be glad to have one more, so we cornered her in the barn and put her in his truck and now she seems happy. I told Jason that if anybody showed up at my place demanding his goat and threatening to hang goat rustlers, I would send him right over. He said that would be fine.

I believe that God sends me these bizarre things to teach me some lessons, but I am not always sure what the lesson is supposed to be. Maybe the lesson is that I should be more open to new and different things. After all, as a cattle owner I was certainly looking askance at something that was not a cow in my pasture. I have always thought of myself as a cattleman and not a goat boy! Could I adjust and tolerate something different? Am I really that set in my ways?

On the other hand, maybe the lesson is about the importance of boundaries. Annie the Nanny certainly did not have very firm boundaries at my place. The boundaries are good enough for cows, but not firm enough for goats. People need clear boundaries as well. Setting boundaries is very important in the raising of children, for example. Children who grow up without clear and loving boundaries grow up to be insecure adults. Children want to know if anybody cares enough to stop them from going astray until they fall off the edge of the world. They may resent the limits at times, but they are at least secure in them. Adam and Eve had clear boundaries in the Garden of Eden but they transgressed those and that is where the trouble begins.

Another possible lesson is the importance of being able to recognize where home is. Annie the Nanny was really trying to make herself at home, but this was no place for her. This was not her home. This arrangement fit her like a saddle on a sow. In many ways, this is similar to all of us people living on this earth. We would like to think it is our home, but it really is not. God has something much better for us in mind and we need to not get too attached to this world and all its enticing stuff. I am reminded of the old hymn that says, "I'm but a stranger here – heaven is my home". Let's not get too comfortable with this life, because it is not home.

Maybe the lesson is simply to expect the unexpected on this side of the grave. We really don't know how things are going to turn out or what might come our way and it behooves us to trust that whatever it is, the Lord will see us through.

One thing the goat experience is not trying to tell me is that I am the G.O.A.T., meaning the "Greatest of All Time". So, all in all, it was an interesting experience with Annie the Nanny and maybe I learned some lessons. Truth be told, I kind of miss her.
